In September, we...

Accepted 36 cats into our foster program.

Assisted 26 animals with finding their forever families. Yay!

Transported **95 cats and 13 dogs** to get fixed and vaccinated, bringing our year-to-date total up to **999 animals!** So close!

Served 4 dogs and 31 cats during our monthly pet food pantry. That included:

- · 68 pounds of dry dog food
- · 59 pounds of dry cat food
- · 113 cans of wet cat food.
- · 74 pounds of cat litter.
- Plus treats, pads, bowls, medicine, and more!

We'd like to give a huge THANK YOU to Phil Hall, PA! Through our donors' help and our partnership with Meals on Wheels, we've given food to local senior citizens' pets. We delivered 30 pounds of dry dog food, 56 pounds of dry cat food, and plenty of toys.

TAIL ME ABOUT IT!

Why are black cats considered unlucky?

Black cats have long been associated with witchcraft, magic, and misfortune. Depictions of these furry friends can be found in many front yards on Halloween, and their adoptions tend to go up this time of year.

First, note that black cats are not a bad omen. They are adorable, smart, and sweet like any other feline. The only unlucky thing about black cats is that they are adopted less often than other cats, as they don't show up in photos as easily. Dogs face the same issue.

Black cats are prone to superstitions. While most Westerners assume they're just plain unlucky, not everyone agrees! For example, Scottish and Welsh tales often placed black cats in a positive light. Some fishers and sailors preferred black cats as "ship cats," as they were seen as auspicious animals.

Some old tales did ascribe certain harmful supernatural spirits to black cats, such as the Scottish cat-sith or the Welsh Cath Palug. It is clear that there were many supernatural associations with black cats in either light. So much supernatural association likely led to their association with witches.

For much of history, witches didn't have a positive association. People may love them today, but back then they did all sorts of horrible things to alleged witches. They extended these attitudes to "their" cats and treated these adorable hunters with the same cruelty. This hateful tradition was brought to Colonial America by pilgrims. Today, this tradition perseveres through the false belief that black cats are unlucky.

This Halloween, pet a black cat. You won't regret it.
