





Maybe the most amazing yet also saddest interactions we had this past year was with our little kitten named Combo. Combo was found with his three siblings, Burger, Fries, and Drink, outside in the dirt with no mother around. Combo was a "Janus" kitten which means they are born with two faces. Sadly Janus kittens don't live more than 24hrs in most cases. We were lucky enough to get 48hrs with this little guy while him and his siblings stayed clean, warm, and loved in a foster home. We love and celebrate every life.



Speaking of our low-cost spay/neuter clinic, we made a lot of progress in 2021! We were able to complete the initial clearing of the land where the clinic will be (off Pine Blossom Rd in Milton). That may not sound like much, but it's a huge step forward! Now, we're working on finalizing the site plan and submitting the development order. Exciting news: If all goes according to plan, we expect to order the building by the end of this year! We are getting closer and closer to achieving this dream, but there's still a long road and a LOT of fundraising ahead of us. Then, in June 2021, we held our first annual Puttin' Fore Paws Charity Golf Tournament to raise money for the low-cost spay/neuter clinic we're building in Santa Rosa County. We were able to raise \$28,000 with help from our generous sponsors and everyone who participated! Another very special event from last year was our fourth annual A New Leash on Love adoption event in November! We were joined by many vendors and rescue organizations from the community, all of whom contributed to the event's success! 14 animals from various rescues found their forever homes that day. Now, we're preparing and looking forward to this year's A New Leash on Love, which is being planned for November 12, 2022! That's when we stepped in to provide reinforcement. We decided it was time for a "Targeted TNR" case, which means trapping and spaying or neutering every single community cat in a certain vicinity. Our volunteers spent two months visiting this property then every single day for the last week, setting traps and collecting the cats. During this time, our team cared for all the collected cats at our facility, where each and every one received specialized care and treatment awaiting their vet visit.



We finished off 2021 with another huge undertaking, Project Hallelujah. During this project, we trapped, fixed, vaccinated, and supplied prevention to 83 cats in one neighborhood!

The project started when we found out how badly the cats in this neighborhood were suffering. They were sick and dying, and they kept producing more and more kittens who were also sick and dying. Their human caretakers did everything they could to help, including trapping several of the cats for TNR themselves. But cats multiply quickly, and soon the numbers were greater than these dedicated community members could handle on their own.



Then, we transported all the cats to Operation Spay Bay, where they were fixed and ear-tipped. From there, 60 of the cats were returned to their original outdoor homes where we had trapped them. The other 23 were adopted into new homes, either as barn cats or indoor pets, to help ease the burden on the caretakers and the surrounding neighborhood.

BY THE NUMBERS

2021 wasn't all about special projects. We also impacted the community through the life-saving programs we run all year long, including our low-cost spay/neuter transportation service, our rescue and rehabilitation program, our monthly pet food pantry, and our Bowl Fillers program.

Here's a look at everything our regular programs accomplished last year by the numbers.

In 2021, we...


Accepted **389 needy cats and kittens** and **47 fancy rats** into our foster program.

Guided **402 animals** to their forever families (not including those who found new homes through Project Hallelujah). Yay!!!

Transported 1,331 cats and 101 dogs to get fixed and vaccinated, for a grand total of 1,432 spayed or neutered animals!

Served an average of **15 dogs and 24 cats** every month at our pet food pantry, held on the second Sunday of each month.


Fed an average of **7 dogs and 9 cats** belonging to senior citizens every month through the Bowl Fillers program, which we run in partnership with the Council on Aging. Thanks to everyone who sponsored a month of Bowl Fillers last year, including our December sponsor, Your Pace Yoga!



While we're talking about numbers, we wanted to take this opportunity to share some annual statistics from our local shelter, Santa Rosa County Animal Services. In case you didn't know, A HOPE was originally founded in 2017 to reduce the rates of unnecessary euthanasia in Santa Rosa County. At the time, we had the third highest euthanasia rate in the entire state of Florida - not a title to be proud of. At all. But things are much different now, thanks in large part to our community, the supporters, and the responsible pet owners and cat caretakers who really stepped up.

Let's begin by talking about those euthanasia rates. In 2016, 66.33% of the animals who came to the shelter were euthanized. In 2021, that number was down to 3.75%! That's a HUGE difference in the number of animals who get help and homes after walking in those shelter doors. For reference as to how that relates to our mission, the shelter's euthanasia rates had their first significant drop in 2019 (from 63.84% to 27.88%). 2019 was also the biggest year for our spay/neuter transportation service to date. That year, we helped 1,943 animals get spayed or neutered (as opposed to just 685 the previous year).

# Animals Spayed/Neutered vs Euthanized Data From Santa Rosa County Animal Services




Our mission includes sterilization of dogs and cats so unwanted litters being born will be a thing of the past. This high volume, low cost service directly impacts the number of animals who end up at the shelter. In 2016, the shelter took in a total of 6,011 animals. Flash forward just five years and only 3,202 animals ended up at the shelter in 2021! The proof of the work we do is obvious. The proof that a community can come together to save lives, is remarkable! We will continue working hard in 2022 and far into the future to make sure these numbers keep dropping!

With 402 total adoptions, 2021 was a busy year for our rescue and rehabilitation program! Let's look back at some of the most memorable transformations from sick and dying... to happy, healthy, and **LOVED** from the past year.



Maggie came to us after being abandoned at the shelter full of maggots. After a few months of TLC in a foster home, she found her forever home as a therapy cat helping trauma victims, known as a advoCAT!



Mindy was in the middle of the road in a storm, covered with fly eggs (maggots). They were in her eyes, ears, and rectum...when her eyes weren't even open yet. She lost one eye to the ordeal, but she's otherwise healthy and thriving with her loving family!



Machine Gun Kelly was found with her leg wrapped in insulation, the bone crushed. Just 10 days of foster care later, she was running and playing, as good as new! She's living happily ever after in her new home, with all four legs intact.



## TAIL ME ABOUT IT!

## Lisa asks: Some of the mama kitties you guys get look so young. How early can a cat get pregnant?

We agree! Many female cats have their first litter of kittens at a very young age. That's because they reach sexual maturity and go into heat for the first time at around 4 months old in our area (this is mostly related) to outside temperatures). Though some may think it's cute, they're still kittens themselves and growing, so it's not healthy for their bodies to go through the stress of pregnancy. It's so important to get your cat spayed as soon as she's old enough and big enough for the procedure so you can avoid an early (or any) pregnancy. Kittens can get fixed as young as 8 weeks old at some clinics. Per the American Veterinary Medical Association, it is NOT always best to wait for dogs or cats to go into their first heat. They also recommend getting animals fixed before they're five months old. This is especially tru ein overpopulated areas, like where we are!



You should also know your cat can get pregnant again as soon as a few weeks after giving birth. Yes, they can go right back into heat right after delivery. If one pregnancy is too much for her growing body, two back-toback pregnancies would be downright cruel and dangerous! If your cat is currently pregnant and you have a plan for the kittens to get the vet services they need and rehomed. she can be fixed when the kittens are eating solids at about 5 to 6 weeks old (she can go back to nursing afterwards). If you don't have a plan for them, please get them fixed asap. We offer low cost services with no extra charge for in heat or pregnant animals. We love responsible pet parents!
